

The Kansas Historical Society: How to Search for Newspapers & Genealogical Records

Before you begin, consider:

- Kansas residents have access to newspapers and genealogical records through the Kansas Historical Society for free. Some KS newspapers published before 1923 are not available in digital form yet.
- The patron will need to provide a Kansas Driver's License or state ID. There is no limit regarding the amount of times a resident can log in.
 - For non-residents, this link provides open access to KSHS content published on Newspapers.com for more than three years; no residency verification required. Click <u>here</u> or go to: <u>https://kansashistoricalopencontent.newspapers.com/</u>
- It is possible to visit KSHS in Topeka, but an appointment is required: (785) 272-8681.
- Options for out-of-state research include: 1) locating the local historical society; 2) completing an online ILL request on swkls.org <u>here</u>; or, 3) purchasing a personal subscription.
 - Most American newspapers have been scanned and are available online. If the patron specifically requests a microfilm reel, it may not be possible. Microfilm is delicate and sometimes irreplaceable. Additional charges might occur.
 - KSHS fees: If paper copies are made, or if the librarian performs additional research, a fee will be charged. Paper copies cost 35¢/page, and each request costs \$25.
- Personal subscription options available:

 - \rightarrow 2) Paid subscription for \$8 \$20/month.
 - o Ancestry.com
 - \rightarrow 3) Free 14-day trial.

KSHS digital partner websites

Kansas residents with a valid driver's license or state ID may freely access KSHS content on the following sites by logging in below.

- Ancestry.com includes millions of Kansas records from the State Archives and Research Collections, among them Kansas State Census Records from 1865-1925, Civil War Enlistment Papers of Kansas Volunteer Regiments (1862, 1863, 1868), and selected World War I manuscripts.
- Newspapers.com is digitizing historic Kansas newspapers from the Society's nearcomprehensive collections.

Searching:

- 1. Click <u>here</u> or go to <u>https://www.kshs.org/ancestry/drivers/dlverify</u>.
- 2. Patron enters her/his name, DL or ID #, and DOB. Click <u>enter</u>.
- 3. Patron clicks either:
 - Ancestry.com
 - \circ The next screen will lead the patron to a search screen. Enter relevant information, then click search.

- At the very bottom of the screen is a "data collection list" that can be browsed.
- KSHS also has these genealogy indexes available for free use. Click <u>here</u> or go to: <u>https://www.kshs.org/p/genealogy-indexes/18943</u>
- Newspapers.com (It may take a moment to load.)
 - Type the name of newspaper, keyword, person's name, year, etc. directly in the bar at the top labeled "search this collection".
 - "Digitization of pre-1923 newspapers published in Kansas is nearly complete with about 12 pages now available. There are a few pre-1923 titles still waiting to be digitized, and [KSHS] will be working [to complete] those in the near future."
- 4. The patron can access additional newspapers for free through the Library of Congress. Click <u>here</u> or go to: <u>https://chroniclingamerica.loc.gov/newspapers/?state=Kansasðnicity=&language=</u>
 - Titles are listed in alphabetical order.
- 5. If the patron is unable to find the information s/he is seeking, then s/he is welcome to ask KSHS directly. Click <u>here</u> or go to <u>https://www.kshs.org/p/ask-a-research-question/10096</u>. Example:
