


### **Results: 10 Minute Pre-Workshop Questionnaire**

#### 1. Fill in the blank: When I think about DEI titles in my library, these are my thoughts/concerns/fears:


- making my older colleagues upset for ordering them


3. Choose one option below: In the past six months, I have read or listened to a book with an LGBTQ+ character.








## 7. Rate your comfort level regarding having DEI materials in the library. $\ensuremath{\text{10 responses}}$




#### 9. If you answered "yes" or "I am not sure" to #8, would you share your plans with us, please?
